On climate change, the climate leadership plan, carbon taxes and more

In late 2015, the Alberta Government released its Climate Leadership Plan, a high-level policy document based upon the recommendations of the Climate Change Advisory Panel. The Climate Leadership Plan focuses on four key areas for further development:

- implementing a new carbon price on greenhouse gas (GHG) pollution,
- phasing out coal-generated electricity and developing more renewable energy,
- legislating an oil-sands emissions limit, and
- employing a new methane emission reduction plan.

Climate change litigation, in Canada and around the world, is even now only at conception stage and is likely to become an increasingly important point of legal consideration (especially as governments give increased attention to climate change issues and as climate change impacts begin to manifest).

In response to these developments, the ELC is publishing the **Climate Change Legal Roadmap** series and a blog series – exploring climate change law and developments in other jurisdictions, insights from our related law reform research and making recommendations for Alberta.

Do we have the rights we need?

Most Canadians and Albertans are in the privileged position of living with clean air and clean water yet many in Canada still live with degraded (and often dangerous) water quality, poor air quality and threats to biodiversity. A fundamental question, then, is whether having access to clean air and water and a healthy environment a privilege or a right?

Laws which grant and protect rights to a clean and healthy environment provide us with tools to maintain our environment today and for future generations.

The ELC has undertaken a review of the current state of environmental rights in Alberta and notes there are clear deficiencies in Alberta's current treatment of environmental rights.

The Environmental Law Centre is publishing a series of educational materials concerning legal rights related to environmental quality. This work is in support of enacting laws that will foster environmental quality for future generations of Albertans.

OTHER PROJECTS

Municipalities have a central role play in environmental to management. They have the responsibility for local land use planning through the use of statutory plans (for example, development plans municipal and area structure plans) and land use by-laws and development, through subdivision and development permit processes. The ELC would like to see municipalities fully empowered to take actions to protect the environment.

Since 2014 when the Municipal Government Act (MGA) review was first announced, the ELC has commented, reviewed existing and proposed legislation, participated in open houses, and submitted recommendations as it is our view that municipalities have a pivotal role to play in environmental management and protection in Alberta. <u>See more</u> <u>about this project online</u>.





Environmental Law in High Schools

With support from the Alberta Law Foundation, the ELC has launched a program to bring environmental law education into Alberta high schools.

By partnering with schools and teachers from across Alberta we will design materials tailored to complement existing Science and Social Studies curriculums. Materials are being developed to be introduced to a select number of students in a pilot program, before introducing this critical area of study to 150,000 high school students across Alberta in due course.

GREEN REGS 'N' HAM OCTOBER 5, 2016:

100 people from a variety of fields: oil and gas, environmental consulting, government agencies and other industry gathered for the *Green Regs 'n' Ham* breakfast. Hosted by the ELC, speakers Andrew Leach and Sharon Mascher tackled the topic: *Is a carbon tax our next Lorax*?

Energy and environmental economist Andrew Leach - who was Chair of the Climate Leadership Panel in Alberta and is Associate Professor at the Alberta School of Business at the University of Alberta - provided an excellent overview on the development and implementation of Alberta's carbon tax. In the course of his discussion, he noted that carbon taxes are already included in most companies' planning and many other factors rank higher on investor concerns than the potential impacts of a carbon tax.

Sharon Mascher, from the University of Calgary Faculty of Law, noted that a carbon tax alone cannot solve the climate change problem. Carbon taxes must be supported with other instruments to make a real difference in mitigating climate change. Sharon further noted that carbon taxes may need to be increased in order to meet Canada's obligations under the Paris Agreement, which may be likely to shift behaviours to lower carbon emissions. She encouraged Albertans to be leaders and innovators, as there is now significant and positive international attention on British Columbia and Alberta for taking positive steps towards addressing climate change.


