Law and the sun: common law and statutory rights related to the sun and solar energy We will develop an up-to-date guide of legal rights and regulatory frameworks related to solar energy. This project will include review and updates to both codified and common law rights related to solar energy as well as provide a review of jurisdictional approaches to regulating solar energy generation.



Regulatory approaches to funding conservation and environmental protection

How do we pay for the costs of conservation and environmental protection? This project investigates different approaches to generate funding for environmental stewardship. This includes looking at Alberta and other jurisdictions for regulatory approaches: authorization specific levies, conservation specific tax allocations, and other regulatory tools.

Water law in Alberta: An education guide

An education guide on how laws of the province, the federal government and municipalities impact how we interact with water. This guide will provide Albertans with a legal education resource that aims to broaden understanding and knowledge about water law and to increase compliance with the law.
