#3 Frequently Asked Environmental Law Questions NEW LAKEFRONT DEVELOPMENT

Q:

A new acreage/cottage development has been proposed for a lake close to my property. I am concerned about this and want to ensure that the development occurs in an orderly, aesthetically pleasing way, and does not have an overall negative impact on the natural values of the lake. I am also concerned that the use of recreational vehicles on the water not be allowed. What can I do to ensure these values are protected?

A:

As a neighbor, you have the right to have input on the development.

Municipal Development is governed by the *Municipal Government Act*, which requires a municipality have a Land Use Bylaw that lists the permitted and discretionary uses for the various districts within the municipality. With proper notice and hearings, the Bylaw can be amended. As a neighbouring property owner you can make representation at the hearing.

Under the Land Use Bylaw, the developer will have to apply for a development permit. Public notice is required of all permits granted. This will allow you to express your concerns to the municipality. The permit will be granted automatically if the use fits within the permitted uses. There is no appeal.

If a development permit is granted as a discretionary use, you may appeal this decision to the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board of the municipality. An unhappy developer may also appeal to that Board. The developer must also apply for subdivision approval from the municipal subdivision authority. That authority must give adjacent landowners, like you if you live close enough, notice of the application and must consider your written submissions. Although you do not have the right to appeal this decision if you don't like it, you do have the right to be heard if the developer or a government body appeals to the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board of the Municipality.

A further limited appeal lies from the decision of the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board to the Court of Appeal of Alberta on questions of law and jurisdiction. In addition some decisions of municipal authorities can be appealed by way of an application for judicial review to the Court of Queen's Bench of Alberta. You would be wise to have a lawyer act for you regarding these proceedings.

The federal government regulates boating under its authority over shipping. The Boating Restriction Regulations list the lakes where boating is forbidden or restricted. The federal government consults the provinces annually in making this list. There is authority that a municipality may, under its land use rules, validly restrict boating within its borders without federal approval.
