

Message from

the Executive Director

It is hard to look back at 2023 without considering the smoke filled skies much of Alberta faced throughout the summer. The wildlife smoke that blanketed much of our province was a stark reminder of how nature remains the final arbiter in the world: of water, of air, of forests. It is a reminder that our lives on the planet can be precarious and that we should take action to minimize our impacts on nature, to maintain the services that the environment provides. This is where law and policy play a key role. Whether mitigating our greenhouse gas emissions or ensuring rivers retain sufficient flows for aquatic health in drought; clear and accountable laws and policies are needed.

It is in furtherance of these laws and policies that the ELC also had some significant milestones in 2023. Most notable, the ELC has become an affiliated institute at the University of Alberta, Faculty of Law. Our new office space is set among the law reports, jurisprudence and journals we fondly remember from our days in law school. 


