2022: A NOTE FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

Dear Friends of the ELC,

A time of reflection and a time of opportunity.

As we make our way in 2023 the ELC is reflective on past challenges and is optimistic for the future. In this year-end review, the ELC reflects on major projects that were rolled out in 2022, including:

- <u>A comprehensive guide to water law in the province;</u>
- <u>A review of forestry law in the province;</u>
- <u>New opportunities to generate revenue for environmental</u> <u>management</u>; and
- <u>Reimagining rivers workshop and webinars</u>.

This was among other projects that are being researched and rolled out in the early 2023, including:

- Detailing the challenges of environmental regulation in the context of the Canadian Constitution;
- Review and analysis of current contaminated sites legislation and jurisprudence.

From an organizational perspective we are optimistic for the ELC's future to increase our strategic focus on robust evaluation of laws and policies and environmental decision making in the province. We recognize that often the letter of the law is only part of the picture and evaluation of decision-making processes must become more of a focus.

New projects launching in Spring of 2023 include a focus on elevating the discussion around species at risk, providing context for new legislation to address species at risk in the province. We will also be starting a project focus on evaluation of decision making and how these decisions are protecting, or failing to protect, Alberta's native grasslands.

Finally, we will be launching our "Rights of Nature" project, a project that will seek to change the current governance approach to protecting our environment.

As the world moves to implement the global biodiversity framework, we reflect on some of Alberta's key environmental challenges around species

and biodiversity that remain unresolved; our laws and policies have been slow to respond to the needs of the most at-risk species. The list of endangered species in Alberta is lengthy, with many iconic species needing legal protection, including Woodland Caribou, Bull Trout, and Greater Sage-grouse.

While some significant challenges lie ahead, the ELC will play an important role in ensuring that government decision making is accountable to nature and ecosystems. With the help of partners - both current and new - we see an opportunity for Alberta to become a regulatory and policy leader in environmental management.

Your ongoing support for the ELC's work is truly appreciated. Together we can ensure that the ecosystems and natural spaces of Alberta thrive and that Albertans have the benefit of a healthy environment for the long-term.



Environment and Constitutional Law

Upcoming legal reports setting out the state of the law in areas of constitutional conflict and setting about ways to harmonizing our environmental regulations, an issue that is particularly timely in Alberta:

- species at risk, fisheries, toxic substances, impact assessment and more.
- impact of environmental regulation on Indigenous treaty rights, with a report forthcoming in early 2023.

Clean Energy Improvement Tax Analysis Project Property-Assessed Clean Energy (PACE), or the Clean Energy Improvement Tax in Alberta, is an innovative tool that provides access to long-term financing for energy efficiency, water conservation, renewable energy, and resiliency measures. We will undertake law and policy research, analysis and recommendations in relation to the legislative framework of PACE in Alberta.

Alberta's Native Grasslands

This evaluation project is aimed at assessing decisions of regulators and tribunals and how their decisions are protecting, or failing to protect, Alberta's native grasslands.

Rights of Nature & Reimagining Rivers

Alberta's habitat, water and species are often harmed due to failures in our legal system. The *Rights of Nature* project will bring broad awareness to laws and policies and their interlinkage with nature and offer alternative paths forward. The *Rights of Nature* project was initiated as part of ELC's work regarding how our laws and policies protect rivers. This focus on rivers, called "Reimagining Rivers", involves a collaboration with the Centre of Constitutional Studies based at the University of Alberta. This work with continue into 2023 and be expanded to include rights of nature more generally.

Endangered Species Act for Alberta The ELC's project includes drafting and advocacy around an Endangered Species Act for Alberta.
