The Centre excels as an environmental law resource because it has responded to its new challenges without wavering from its core purpose of promoting better environmental laws to ensure protection of our environment.

About the Centre

The Environmental Law Centre (Alberta) Society ("ELC" or "Centre") was incorporated in 1982 under the *Societies Act*. The ELC's express purpose is to provide Albertans with an objective source of information about environmental and natural resources law. Revenue Canada has conferred charitable status on the Centre.

The ELC's overall goal is to make the law and legal processes work to protect the environment. To achieve this goal, the Centre pursues three policy objectives: that governments enact good environmental laws, that laws and policies provide to the public an effective role in environmental regulatory and law-making processes, and that environmental regulatory and law-making processes offer a level playing field to participants.

The ELC carries out three main activities: Public Programs, Fee for Service, and Search Services. All net revenue from the latter two programs is applied to support the Centre's Public Programs.

Permanent staff members undertake ELC program delivery with the assistance of contract researchers and volunteers, as needed. A volunteer Board of Directors oversees ELC operations. Members of the Board represent a full range of interests in environmental law in Alberta including legal, business and industrial, governmental, academic, general public and environmental. To the extent possible, Board members are from various Alberta geographical regions.

Public Programs Backgrounder
The core ELC public programs are Request for Assistance,
Monitoring and Reform, Public Library of
Environmental Law, Seminars, Emerging Issues, and
Ongoing Publications.

In addition to core public programs, the Centre also has term public projects. These are **Environmental Education**, **Research and Law Reform Projects** with a beginning and an end and **Environmental Publications** resulting from those projects.

This Annual Report presents highlights of both ongoing and term public programs.

Ongoing Public Programs Request for Assistance

Without accurate environmental law information, public interest organizations, including environmental groups, businesses, lawyers, and other members of the public and private sectors cannot effectively deal with environmental issues or participate in regulatory and consultation processes. Through its Request for **Assistance** service, a major component of its Information and Referral program, the ELC meets this need. This service enables members of the public to contact the Centre, either by telephone, including a 1-800 line, fax, email or in person, and receive information on environmental law from a knowledgeable, independent source. This free service is unique in Alberta and is supported by the Alberta Law Foundation, net revenue transfers from the Centre's Search Services and by the charitable donors to the Environmental Law Centre.

In 2000 Centre staff answered over 900 requests for assistance

Monitoring and Reform

Through this service Centre staff forward the Centre's conviction that environmental laws and policies should work to protect the environment. In realizing this conviction staff serve on law reform or monitoring committees, participate in critical law reform processes, prepare and submit reform briefs and educate, assist and even mediate in reform or monitoring processes.

Here are just a few 2000 highlights:

Centre Submissions to the ...

- Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency on the five-year review of the *Canadian Environmental Assessment Act*, calling for better federal environmental assessment legislation.
- Alberta Energy and Utilities Board in response to its consultation on the sulphur recovery guidelines and sour gas plants.
- Federal Standing Committee on Environment and Sustainable Development regarding the proposed *Species at Risk Act*, calling for effective endangered species legislation.
- Alberta Energy and Utilities Board on Alberta's Draft Industrial Release Guidelines.
- Federal Agriculture and Agri-Food relating to Canada's Sustainable Development Strategy.
- Alberta Environment regarding a proposed policy framework for reclamation and remediation certificates for oil and gas sites.
- The Department of Municipal Affairs on the need to remove property tax disincentives to conserve land in a natural state.

- Alberta Energy and Utilities Board (EUB) to facilitate cooperation and better understanding between members of the Canadian Association of Petroleum Producers and environmental nongovernmental organizations and of the EUB on intervenor costs in energy related proceedings

- Alberta Agriculture, Food and Rural Development (AFRD) Stakeholders Advisory Committee to develop recommendations for intensive livestock operations regulations;
- The AFRD initiated Alberta Environmentally Sustainable Agriculture Council.
- City of Edmonton Councilors Phair and Bolstad ad hoc committee on the Preservation of Environmentally Significant Natural Sites in Edmonton.

Seminars

ELC legal and library staff receive many requests to speak at meetings, conferences, classes and other gatherings. Because of their unique expertise ELC staff members are in considerable demand for this activity. The following highlight just a few of the many 2000 seminar or invited speaking engagements. Talks to:

- government representatives such as for municipal council members of municipalities near Sylvan Lake sponsored by the Sylvan Lake Watershed Stewardship Association; and to a workshop for Alberta Agriculture, Food and Rural Development staff involved in public participation projects.
- youth and young adults, including being guest speaker at NAIT and at numerous University of Alberta classes on environmental law topics.
- lawyers and other business professionals on topics including due diligence as defense to environmental offences, enforcement of water laws, and on the law governing contaminated lands.
- public and non-government organizations including at a conference of the Alberta Conservation Association on using conservation easements to protect watershed; to the North American Waterfowl Management Plan on wetlands law and policy in Alberta and creative sentencing; to the Council of Canadians on trade agreements and water exports and to a national land stewardship conference on overcoming legal and policy disincentives to conservation.
- regulated industry, including at the Alberta Irrigation Products Association on the enforcement of the *Water Act* and the proposed federal *Species at Risk Act*.
- multi-stakeholder groups such as to the Edson Sustainable Communities Initiative group on community monitoring of environmental pollution.

In addition, in 2000 the ELC revived its "Brown Bag Seminars" -- an informal lunchtime get together at the Centre's offices where anyone can hear an expert talk on an important environmental issue free of charge

Public Library of Environmental Law

The Environmental Law Centre's **Public Library of Environmental Law** is a major source of environmental law materials in Canada. Anyone can visit this library and borrow materials. The Centre's librarian or staff will help users find what they need. In 2000, the collection grew to well over 17,000 items including: journals, cases, decisions of administrative tribunals, videotapes and loose-leaf services. Since 1998, the library catalogue has been searchable via the Centre's website at http://www.elc.ab.ca.

Dow Sustainable Development Project

Through a three-year grant from Dow Chemical Canada, the Centre has established the **Dow Sustainable Development Collection** at its library. Also, through this grant the Centre has developed and posted on its website **Frequently Asked Questions** information sheets that reflect sustainable development.

Ongoing Publications

The ELC continues to facilitate access to environmental law information through its publications. The Centre publishes three ongoing periodicals. These are:

- News Brief a quarterly publication of short articles and columns on environmental law developments in Alberta and Canada.
- Regulatory Review a monthly update on environmental law developments in Alberta, British Columbia, Manitoba, Northwest Territories, Nunavut, Saskatchewan, and the Yukon supported by the Environmental Services Association of Alberta.
- Journal of Environmental Law and Practice - the only scholarly environmental law journal in Canada, edited by the ELC, and supported by Carswell and a donation from Gowling Lafleur Henderson LLP.

Term Public Programs

Here are just a few highlights from 2000:

Community Monitoring Facilities

This two-year project is geared to assist Alberta citizens to understand the law regulating environmental effects of industrial facilities, develop skills and judgment necessary to monitor and understand the environmental effects of industries in their area, and to build partnerships with government, industry and technical experts for environmental protection. *The Alberta Law Foundation and the Edmonton Community Lottery Board fund the project.*

A Guide to Laws and Policies that can affect Alberta's Wetlands

This two year project, scheduled to be completed in 2001, is aimed at those who wish to protect and maintain Alberta's wetlands. The Guide will address the entire range of laws and policies that can effect wetlands, including public land, water, environmental, municipal and energy development laws. The North American Waterfowl Management Plan through Ducks Unlimited Canada fund the project.

• Addressing Resource Conflicts in Alberta's Northern Boreal Forests

The Environmental Law Centre is a partner in this two year project, scheduled to be completed in 2001, with the Calgary based Canadian Institute of Resources Law. The Centre's contribution will examine and address land use conflicts between the oil and gas industry and agriculture, and between wildlife biodiversity interests and agriculture. The Alberta Law Foundation is the funder of this project.

• Who Does What—An Alphabetical Guide to Environmental Jurisdiction

This two-year project will produce a layperson's environmental law primer and guide to environmental jurisdictions of 100 common matters such as air, water, forestry projects, landfills, wildlife and oil and gas developments. Entries for the guide were determined through public consultation. *The Alberta Law Foundation is the funder of this project.*

• Update of Demystifying Forestry Law

This two year project will update and expand the Centre's popular and useful 1990 publication *Demystifying Forestry Law*, the only comprehensive guide to Alberta public land forestry law. New sections will include one on aboriginal rights, and entitlements and one on recommendations. *The Alberta Law Foundation and the Austin S. Nelson Foundation are funders of this project*.

• Update of Good Riddance

This two year project will expand and update the Centre's 1992 publication on laws and policies governing waste management in Alberta. New sections include one on waste management on Indian Reserves and Metis lands and one on recommendations. *The Alberta Law Foundation is the funder of this project.*

Environmental Publications

In 2000, the ELC published a major study titled *Get* the Real Dirt, Contaminated Real Estate and the Law in Alberta. The Alberta Real Estate Foundation funded this project.

The Business Connection

Through a special three year grant from **Western Economic Diversification** the Centre will extend its Information and Referral services reach to small and medium sized businesses in the four western provinces. This new service is called "**Business Connections**". It includes Requests for Assistance, Seminars, and Frequently Asked Questions ("FAQ") information sheets of interest to small businesses. There are three phases to this service. In Phase One, 1999, the ELC completed its Alberta service offering. In 2000 and in 2001 the Centre will extend its services to Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia.

The ELC's publication catalogue, containing references to more than 30 books, reviews, submissions, briefs and papers, is posted on the Centre's website.

Other ELC Services

The Centre offers three services in addition to its public programs. These are **Environmental Enforcement Historical Search Service**, **Wellsite Reclamation Historical Search Service** and **Fee for Service**. All of these services are consistent with the Centre's goals and objectives.

Environmental Enforcement Historical Search Service

On written request, the ELC will search a computer data base for the environmental enforcement history of a company or individual, specifically reviewing enforcement action taken by the Environmental Regulatory Service of Alberta Department of Environment under the Alberta Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act, and its predecessor legislation, the Hazardous Chemicals Act, Agricultural Chemicals Act, Clean Water Act and Clean Air Act to 1971. The Centre has operated this service, privatized to the ELC from Alberta Environment, since 1996. For further information, visit the ELC website.

Wellsite Reclamation Historical Search Service

On written request, the ELC will search a computer data base for regulatory actions by Alberta Environment relating to reclamation issued under Alberta's *Environmental Protection and Enhancement Act*, and its predecessor legislation, the *Land Surface Conservation and Reclamation* Act and the *Surface Reclamation Act*, This service, privatized to the ELC from Alberta Environment, has been operated by the Centre since 1998. For more information, visit the ELC website.

All net revenue from the Centre's Search Services is applied to fund and support the Centre's Public Programs.

Fee for Service

In 2000, ELC lawyers continued to undertake fee for service work to provide services requiring our expertise.

Here are some examples:

- Contracts with conservation organizations, environmental groups and environmental consultants to provide services such as arranging, facilitating and speaking at meetings on environmental law topics and providing environmental law and policy information.
- Contracts for the Federal Government and Alberta Government relating to environmental laws and legislation.

Notes To Financial Statements For The Year Ended December 31, 2000

1. PURPOSE OF THE SOCIETY

Environmental Law Centre (Alberta) Society works to ensure that the law serves to protect and preserve the environment through public information, education, research and law reform.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Environmental Law Centre (Alberta) Society is a registered charity incorporated under the Societies Act of Alberta. These financial statements are prepared under the fund accounting method in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles in Canada and reflect the following policies:

a. Fund Accounting

The purposes of the funds for the allocation of revenue and expenses are as follows:

- The Public Program Fund is to ensure that the law serves to protect and preserve the environment through public information, education, research and law reform.
- ii) The Technology Fund is to provide the Society with the technical resources to carry out the Society's programs.
- iii) The Search Service Fund is to provide the Society with additional revenue to carry out charitable programs.
- The Fee for Service Fund is to provide services to the general public who have requested special services of the Society.
- The Administration Fund is to segregate administrative functions of the Society from the programs provided.

b. Revenue Recognition

i) Unrestricted Contributions

Unrestricted contributions consist of revenue for general purposes and are recognized in the year received.

ii) Restricted Contributions

Restricted contributions consist of revenue for specific projects. The revenue is recognized in the appropriate fund as expenses are incurred over the life of the project.

c. Capital Assets

The Society capitalizes the cost of capital assets over \$5,000 in the year of acquisition. The costs are amortized over one year on a straight line basis. All other capital assets are expensed in the year of acquisition.

d) Income Taxes

No provision is made for income taxes as the Society is exempt under the Income Tax Act.

3. STATEMENT OF CHANGES IN FINANCIAL POSITION

A statement of changes in financial position has not been provided as the information contained in these financial statements is considered to adequately disclose the changes in the Society's financial position.

4. EXTERNALLY RESTRICTED FUND

The Mactaggart Essay Prize Fund is a fund for the annual disbursement of an essay prize pursuant to an agreement with the Mactaggart Third Fund.

6. **REVENUE**

During the year, the Society received \$180,000 (1999 - \$180,000) of its total revenue of \$691,617 (1999 - \$691,498) from the Alberta Law Foundation.

7. INTERFUND TRANSFERS

During the year, the Society's Board of Directors authorized interfund transfers amounting to \$96,300. Of this amount, \$20,000 is to be used for technology purposes and \$76,300 is to be used in the funding of public programs. Transfers of these amounts were made from the Search Service Fund to the Technology Fund and the Public Program Fund respectively.

8. LEASE COMMITMENTS

a) Office Space

On April 26, 1996, the Society committed to a ten-year lease for office space. Future payments under this lease are \$31,715 per annum, plus escalations.

b) Equipment

On February 1, 2001 the Society committed to a 5 year lease for office equipment. Annual payments under this lease are \$3,203

9. JOINT VENTURE

On April 1, 1998, the Environmental Law Centre (ELC) and Canadian Institute of Resources Law (CIRL) entered into an agreement to jointly conduct research on the legal and institutional responses to conflicts over land and resource use in Northern Alberta. The project is funded by the Alberta Law Foundation.
