

2021: A NOTE FROM OUR LEADERSHIP

Dear Friends of the ELC,

With the Covid pandemic still with us and a year of unstable oil and gas prices behind us, there is no question that Alberta is facing significant economic challenges ahead. With this, comes increased pressure and risk to Alberta's wild spaces and ecosystems. Recent disputes over coal mines and parks in Alberta illustrate the current and future policy choices that need our attention. These, and other increasing and conflicting recreational and economic demands on the environment, will need to be reconciled in a way that ensures the long-term protection and health of our ecosystems.

From climate action to contaminated sites, the Environmental Law Centre (ELC) is here to help sustain a healthy environment through policy evaluation and innovation. For 40 years, the ELC has played a key role in finding an effective law and policy path forward to ensure clean water, clean air, abundant species, and effective management of pollution in the province. Your support continues to ensure independent, balanced, and objective research, review and analysis of environmental and natural resources policy and regulation in Alberta.

As we look back on 2021, the ELC has been working to ensure foundational legal education resources are available to Albertans. This includes ongoing work on habitat laws, climate mitigation and adaptation and will soon be rounded off with a guide to water law in Alberta. We have set the stage for future work in ensuring climate mitigation efforts can occur efficiently and effectively and we have started new partnerships to leverage our work to tackle the difficult environmental challenges the province faces.

In the near future, our work will be focused on two priority areas. First, the ELC is pursuing programing to progress the rights of nature which includes educating on the different legal frameworks

for the protection of nature and sharing legal education resources. Second, the ELC will continue to proactively expand our partnerships with watershed planning councils, academics, nonprofit groups, and interested citizens to seek interdisciplinary solutions to Alberta's environmental challenges.

The ELC is also launching a campaign in 2022, titled the "Rights of Nature", to elevate the discourse on legislative approaches to better protect the environment. The work of advocating for laws that will sustain ecosystems and engaging with citizens to promote participation in legal processes continues to be critically important in Alberta. With your support, we will continue to pursue our vision of a society where our laws secure an environment that sustains current and future generations and supports healthy ecosystems.



Regulatory approaches to funding conservation and environmental protection

How do account for the costs of conservation and environmental protection? This project investigates different approaches to generate funding for environmental stewardship. This includes looking at Alberta and other jurisdictions for regulatory approaches: authorization specific levies, conservation specific tax allocations, and other regulatory tools.

Rights of Nature & Reimagining Rivers

Alberta's habitat, water and species are often harmed due to failures in Our legal system. The *Rights of Nature* campaign will bring broad awareness to laws and policies and their interlinkage with nature and offer alternative paths forward. The *Rights of Nature* campaign was initiated as part of ELC's work regarding how our laws and policies



protect rivers. This focus on rivers, called "Reimagining Rivers", involves a collaboration with the Centre of Constitutional Studies based at the University of Alberta. This work with continue into 2022 and be expanded to include rights of nature more generally.

Water law in Alberta: An education guide

An education guide on how laws of the province, the federal government and municipalities impact how we interact with water. This guide will provide Albertans with a legal education resource that aims to broaden understanding and knowledge about water law and to increase compliance with the law.


